ACT 1

The scene is set on a rocky seashore in Cornwall, where the notorious pirates are discovered celebrating the end of Frederick's apprenticeship. Frederick, a young man who was accidentally apprenticed to the pirate band by his nurse, Ruth, is rather despondently considering his release, for today he is 21 and no longer bound by his indentures. He is unfortunately torn between his loyalty to the pirate band, and his duty as a free citizen to expose them. Ruth's problem, however, proves even greater, for since boyhood, Frederick has seen no other woman and she, being secretly in love with him, endeavours to prevent his departure. The issue is further confused by the arrival of 'a bevy of beautiful' maidens, the daughters of Major General Stanley. Frederick, upon seeing them, realises that he has been deceived by Ruth's claim to beauty, and thrusts her from him in anger. The pirates, meanwhile, entranced by the beauty of the girls, and sympathetic to the pleading of the Major General, who claims to be an orphan, make the most of the unexpected opportunity for matrimony.

ACT 2

In a ruined chapel close by, General Stanley is found in pensive mood, accompanied by his daughters, sadly bemoaning his deceit in claiming to be an orphan. Frederick, now free from his apprenticeship, offers his encouragement and claims that the pirates will be liquidated before midnight. A band of police appear on the scene, and rather half-heartedly prepare for the engagement to follow. Frederick is delighted with the apparent success of his plan, and the happier prospect of marrying Mabel, one of the General's daughters, but he is suddenly interrupted by the Pirate King and Ruth, who with tongues in cheek proceed to inform him that through some peculiar circumstance, he was born on 29th February in Leap Year. This, of course, alters the position, as officially he is as yet only 5 according to birthdays, and his apprenticeship does not end until his 21st birthday. Faced with the challenge of doing his duty as a member of the pirate band, Frederick can do no other than reveal the false statement of the Major General, whereupon the Pirate King decides to repay this base deception by death. The inevitable clash between pirates and police occurs, but all ends happily, for the pirates are revealed merely as noblemen who have gone astray, and with the help of the girls are prepared to make amends for their past existence.
