TO OUR AUDIENCE

A POSTER of the Tower Furnishing Company on a London railway station inspired Gilbert to think of an Opera set in Tudor times. Both the partners had an affinity for this period with its conflicting poetic sensitivity and brutality, Gilbert as a keen historian and Sullivan, reared in the strict classical school of music with its deep admiration for the polyphonic style. "Strange Adventure" in Act 2 is a pure madrigal and the words of Dame Carruthers' song in Act 1 are very much in keeping with the poetry of the period.

Here, also, was an opportunity, at a difficult stage in the partnership between these two great men when, owing to shortage of material and only a moderate success with Ruddigore, old operas were being revived — the opportunity to give Sullivan the chance he had always longed for, to write the music for a romantic opera-drama. How different is "Yeomen" from the other operas in plot, characters, style and setting. Gone is the magic lozenge, gone the interchanged babies. Instead we have the Rabbelaisian Tudor mob manhandling the seriocomic jester and his girl, the subnormal ape-like jailer gloating in his prowess with the horrible instruments of torture, the lovely gay daughter of the Sergeant of the Tower given away to a brute and the broken-hearted clown kissing the hem of the dress of the girl for whom he has lived his whole life. Gone also, the usual opening chorus — replaced by the plaintive spinning song.

The scene of the opera is set completely on Tower Green, the grim witness of the execution of many brave and innocent people. One of them, Colonel Fairfax, is awaiting execution on a petty charge. His old friend, Sergeant Meryll, with the connivance of Phoebe and Leonard Meryll, is plotting his escape. This is contrived by Fairfax taking the place of Leonard who, after long absence, has just returned from the wars as a local hero. Fairfax impersonates Leonard Meryll for most of the opera, marries Elsie to outwit his kinsman's claim to his estates and is supposedly shot by Shadbolt. Eventually, Fairfax is reprieved and, married already, he and Elsie are re-united. The usual Gilbertian pairing off takes place, except for Point, who is left collapsing in the centre of the stage. Gilbert intended that he should die and that the opera should be a tragedy.

Finally, pray silence for the overture. This is not pot-pourri of tunes from the opera but a full-blooded beautifully-written concert overture.
