

## CALAMITY JANE

on the American frontier there was often a very fine line, or none at all, between outlaws and lawmen. Most of the cow towns and mining towns of the West were simply grateful to have someone brave enough to strap a pair of six-shooters to his waist and maintain some semblance of law and order. A sheriff who wore a tin badge one day might be swinging from a tree for cattle rustling the next, lynched by the very people whose lives he was protecting—and whose cattle he was stealing! An outlaw in one town might ride on to another and become sheriff.

In 1870 James Butler, better known as Wild Bill Hickock, became sheriff of Abilene, Kansas. Hickock was a crack shot and didn't object to using his guns. In 1861 he had killed three men in a quarrel. He once claimed to have killed over 100 men, "all for good reasons". Hickock concocted fabulous lies about his adventures on the frontier, usually making himself out to be a hero when in reality he had been treacherous or cowardly. His reputation as a gunfighter, aided by his own bragging and the work of imaginative publishers, grew rapidly. After only eight months as sheriff of Abilene, Hickock became a drifter, earning a living as a gambler and lawman; he also appeared with Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. It was in 1876 in Deadwood, Dakota Territory, where gold had been discovered, that he was playing cards in a saloon when a young drifter named lack McCall, walked in and shot him in the back of the head.

artha Canary, later known as Calamity Jane, was born in Missouri in 1852. When she was 12 her family moved to Montana. There are conflicting reports of her life from there on. Some say her parents died when she was young, others that she grew up with her parents, but being in the Wild West, learned to smoke, shoot a gun, and ride a horse - none of which were considered ladylike behaviour in those days. Stories have her as a mule-skinner, a scout for General Custer, and a teamster. There is some evidence that she turned to prostitution when necessary. It is known that she was in the Black Hills of Dakota Territory from 1876 to 1880 during the peak gold-rush period, from 1880 to 1895 she drifted across Kansas, Montana and Wyoming. Calamity Jane called herself Mrs. M. E. Burke for many years, and it is fairly certain that she lived with a hack driver named Clinton Burke. Some accounts say she had a daughter and gave her away as soon as she was born, others that she put her into boarding school when she was a teenager.

There are persistent, though unproven, rumours that Calamity Jane was secretly married to, or had an affair with, Wild Bill Hickock.

She had a natural talent for theatre which she plied, on and off, for years from 1896, appearing in various Wild West shows, where she was billed as "The White Devil of Yellowstone". Unfortunately, she could never stay sober long enough to hold a job. She died in 1903, and her last wish "bury me next to Bill" was carried out. She was buried next to Wild Bill Hickock in Deadwood, South Dakota.
