The Story

The curtain goes up to show a rocky Cornish cove, where the pirates are holding a celebration, and liberally "Pour, Oh, Pour the Pirate Sherry". Young Frederic, one of their number, has completed his apprenticeship, and today takes his place as a fully

trained pirate.

However, Frederic surprises them all by announcing to the Pirate King that, as slave of duty, he did his best for them while under his indentures, but that now that he is free he proposes to leave them that night. His presence with them was, in any case, due to an error. Ruth, once his nurse, and now a pirate maid of all work, confesses that, instructed by his parents to apprentice him to a "pilot", she did not catch what they said, and inadvertently bound him to a "pirate". Frederic explains, he has the greatest affection for the pirates as individuals, but his conscience demands that he devote himself henceforth to exterminating them. The Pirate King comments that they are not very successful at making piracy pay, and Frederic, his sense of duty permitting him to help them until his indentures are completed at midnight, points out that they are much too tender-hearted and also that, being orphans themselves, they never molest an orphan. "Everyone we capture says he's an "The orphan," declares Frederic. last three ships we took proved to be manned entirely by orphans, and so we had to let them go". He urges them to disband and accompany him back to civilization, but the Pirate King points out that, contrasted with respectability, piracy is a comparatively honest pursuit, and that it is a glorious thing ... "To be a Pirate King".

The pirates depart, leaving Frederic with Ruth. She urges him to marry her, but when a bevy of beautiful maidens appear he realises that there are better, and younger, fish to fry. They are all daughters of Major-General Stanley - when they discover Frederic they are delighted with his rare good looks, but alarmed to hear that he is a pirate. He courts their sympathy, and one of them, Mabel, falls in love with him. The pirates suddenly return and seize the girls, and would marry them on the spot but for Mabel's intervention: their father, she informs them, is a Major-General! Major-General Stanley himself appears, and when he announces that he, too, is an orphan the pirates are reduced to tears. They release the Ruth makes another futile attempt to win Frederic's love.

Act II is set in a ruined chapel, where General Stanley humbles himself before the tombs of his ancestors - he lied when saying he was an orphan, and is now filled with remorse. He is not comforted when Frederic arrives and points out that he bought the property only a year ago, "I don't

know whose ancestors they WERE, but I know whose ancestors they ARE" he groans.

But the time for the attack on the pirates has arrived and he calls upon Frederic to summon his forces.

The Police, in single file, march in and form up - but they have little enthusiasm for their task, "When the foeman bares his steel, We uncomfortable feel!" The gallant soldier urges them to attack, and with his daughters takes leave of Frederic.

There is now a new twist to the tale! Frederic, preparing to follow the policemen, is now surprised by the Pirate King and Ruth. Holding him at pistol point they inform him that his apprenticeship is by no means up: he was born on the 29th February in a leap year, and has seen only five Birthdays. Clearly, he has some considerable time yet to serve! Thus, his sense of duty, leaves him no alternative but to rejoin the pirate band, and as a member to tell the Pirate King how the General has deceived him - that he is not really an orphan at all. The Pirate King is furious and swears vengeance - he leaves with Ruth to assault the Mabel returns to find castle. Frederic in tears, but is unable to alter his sense of duty. They vow

undying devotion, and Frederic leaves to rejoin the crew.

The policemen return and Mabel explains that Frederic has quit their ranks. At first they are displeased, but, knowing what duty is, they sympathize and deciding that "A Policeman's Lot is Not a Happy One" decide to press on without him.

The Police hide as the Pirates are heard approaching "With Cat-like Tread". The cutthroats are preparing to advance when General Stanley appears - the pirates seize him. His daughters plead for his life, but without success; he is told to prepare to die. At this the police emerge from hiding to attack the pirates, but are no match for them and are quickly overcome.

As they lie at his mercy, the Pirate King warns the unhappy policemen that it is useless to pretend that they are orphans. But now comes a surprise; the sergeant calls upon them to yield "in the Queen's name" - and at once they do so! Ruth explains, though pirates now, they were once noblemen, and with such a background could not possibly forget their loyalty to the Crown.

As noblemen, of course, they are eligible to marry the General's daughters. He gladly hands them over, and all ends well.
