H.M.S. PINAFORE


After the overture, we board the quarter-deck of H.M.S. Pinafore. It is a busy scene, with sailors splicing ropes, polishing the brasswork and doing other tasks, happily.

On to the scene comes Little Buttercup, a woman of uncertain age, who is to play an important part in the plot of the opera. She has a large basket on her arm and, as she points out, the sailors have just been paid, now is their chance to spend all they can afford on her wares.

Not all the sailors are handsome. The exception shuffles into view through the crowd - misshapen, dark-visaged Dick Deadeye, who frankly declares his ugliness. "I'm three-cornered too ain't I?" he

With the appearance of the commanding officer, Captain Corcoran, we soon realize why this is, in the main, a happy ship. Excessive politeness rather than tough discipline is clearly the order of things. After enquiring after the health of his crew and exchanging courtesies with them, the captain explains himself in song, "My Gallant Crew, Good-morning". But he confesses he is a little sad about the attitude of his daughter Josephine, who is sought in marriage by none less than Sir Joseph Porter, and "she does not seem to tackle kindly to

They go off and Josephine herself appears,





too well". The captain's worst fears are realized when he re-enters and hears from Josephine that her heart is already given to a humble sailor on board his own ship.

Sir Joseph Porter enters, preceded by a flurry of attractive young women - his sisters and his cousins and his aunts - for wherever he goes he takes them with him. (A curious procedure perhaps, but one which provides Gilbert with an unusual way of bringing his female chorus to the stage!) Sir Joseph expounds in song "Now give three cheers" - and then obliges with an account of the unusual manner in which he reached the high office in which he finds himself. He next treats Captain Corcoran to a brief homily on the proper attitude to his crew. "That you are their Captain is an accident of birth" he says. He insists that any request to them must be accompanied by an "if you please". He hands Ralph a copy of a song he has composed for the use of the Royal Navy. "It is' he explains, "designed to encourage inde-pendence of thought and action in the lower branches of the Service, and to teach the principle that a British Sailor is any man's equal excepting minel

Ralph is left on stage alone – to be met by Josephine. He pours out his love for her, but Josephine remains true to the dictates of class distinction. They sing a duet, revealing their true feelings in asides.

The finale to the first act opens with the despairing Ralph announcing that the only thing left for him to do is to blow his brains out. There are sympathetic sounds from the chorus, interrupted by the "I told you so, I told you so" of Dick Deadeye, but nobody does anything to avert the tragedy. Indeed the Boatswain loads a pistol and hands it to Ralph, who puts it to his head while his messmates stop their ears!

But, instead of a loud report, there is the hurried entry of Josephine, crying "Ah! Stay your hand! I love you!" followed by a rapturous ensemble from all except Dick Deadeye, and there is general jollification and the planning for Josephine and Ralph to steal ashore that night to be married.

When the curtain rises on the second act, H.M.S. Pinafore is bathed in moonlight, and Captain Corcoran sings "Fair moon, to thee I sing". Little Buttercup joins him, tells him she has gipsy blood in her veins and can read destinies. She embarks on a series of strange mixed-up proverbs.

Meanwhile Sir Joseph is becoming more and more irritated at Josephine's lack of response to his eloquent pleadings and Captain Corcoran



points out to him that it is probable that his exalted rank has dazzled her. Perhaps Sir Joseph could reason with her and assure her that it is a standing rule at the Admiralty that love levels all ranks?

Josephine, for her part, is pondering upon the choice that lies before her. "The hours creep on a pace". Sir Joseph arrives with the Captain and proceeds to assure Josephine 'officially' that love is a platform upon which all ranks meet, little realizing that he is effectively pleading the case for Ralph and herself. Sir Joseph, the Captain and Josephine - all delighted but for different reasons - then embark on the liveliest ensemble in the opera "Never mind the why and wherefore".

It is now that Dick Deadeye plays his hand. Shuffling up to the Captain he reveals the plan for the elopement of Ralph and Josephine that night.

Captain Corcoran wraps himself in a cloak and lurks in the shadows as the crew tiptoe in, while Ralph and Josephine prepare to depart. Throwing off his cloak, the Captain suddenly reveals himself and demands where his daughter is going with the crew. To the Captain's horror, Ralph declares his love for Josephine, completely justifying his actions by the simple fact that he is an Englishman. Not surprisingly, the Captain bursts out with "Damme, it's too bad!", as Sir Joseph emerges, hears this terrible language and, without waiting for an explanation, banishes Corcoran to his cabin. But when, immediately afterwards, he learns the truth, he has Ralph handcuffed and thrown into the dungeon.

Little Buttercup, however, throws dramatic light on the situation with her confession in "A many years ago."

At Sir Joseph's summons, Ralph appears dressed as a Captain and Corcoran as an ordinary seaman. Even Dick Deadeye joins Josephine, Hebe and Ralph in a quartet of "Oh joy! Oh rapture unforeseen". Ralph embraces his Josephine, Corcoran turns to Little Buttercup, and Sir Joseph settles for Hebe.
