Charlie Girl was first presented for 2201 performances by HAROLD FIELDING at the Adelphi Theatre, London 15th December 1965 to 27th March 1971

It was a run-away hit of the 60's with Joe Brown, Derek Nimmo and Anna Neagle in the leading roles.

DAVID HENEKER and JOHN TAYLOR – Music and Lyrics – David Heneker, during a long career in the regular army, became an occasional songwriter for revues and recording artists. In 1948 he resigned his army commission to become a full-time song-

writer. Whilst working as a pianist at the Embassy Club he was asked by Wolf Mankowitz to join in a collaboration with Julian More and Monty Norman to write a new musical. This becomes Express Bongo, a hit on stage with Paul Schofield and on film with Cliff Richard. The next Heneker-More-Norman collaboration was the English version of Irma La Douce which was a huge international hit, and then Heneker collaborated with Mankowitz and Norman on 'Make Me An Offer'. In 1963 came Heneker's biggest success, 'Half a Sixpence' (Ivor Novello award) with its "Flash, Bang, Wallop" which put a new phrase into the dictionary of quotations! During the run of 'Half a Sixpence', which was also a stage hit in the U.S.A., Japan and Australia, and subsequently a major film, Heneker collaborated with John Taylor on the score of 'Charlie Girl' which brought another Ivor Novello award.

JOHN TAYLOR – received his first West End credit in 1963 as a contributor to 'Six of One' (starring Dora Bryan) and two London Palladium shows, 'Swing Along' and 'Man in the Moon'. His first collaboration with David Heneker was in 1964 for the film 'I've Gotta Horse'. Then came 'Charlie Girl' in 1965.

ROSS TAYLOR – Story Conception – who started his life in the theatre in the chorus line of 'Brigadoon' at Her Majesty's Theatre. From that beginning he has achieved what most artists dream about – to write, choreograph, direct and produce their own shows. Over the last two decades, he has created entertainments for cinema, theatre, television, concert hall and night club – even to staging and directing huge ice spectaculars at Wembley Stadium. In 1979 his life long ambition was realised when he produced Rodgers & Hammerstein's 'The King and I' starring Yul Brynner.

HUGH and MARGARET WILLIAMS – Bookwriters – They together wrote a series of successful West End light comedies, in several of which Hugh Williams starred. 'Charlie Girl' was their only musical.

RAY COONEY – Associate Bookwriter – He began his theatrical career as a boy actor in 'Song of Norway' at the Palace Theatre in 1946. He served his apprenticeship playing in various repertory companies from Worthing to Blackburn before graduating to Brian Rix's company at the Whitehall Theatre in 1956. He played in 'Dry Rot' and 'Simply Spymen' and, in his dressing room at the theatre, began a writing career which to date has produced eleven West End plays. As producer and director he has been responsible for more than thirty London productions including 'Lloyd George Knew My Father', 'Whose Life is it Anyway', 'They're Playing Our Song', 'Duet for One', 'Clouds' and 'Children of a Lesser God'.


