

In a remote part of Mexico stands 'EI Rancho Grande' owned by Mama Inez and her son Ramón. The people who live and work there are happy and proud of their revolutionary leader, Mendoza, and his friend El Zorro, the bandit. Of course everyone, including Lopez the Chief of Police, knows that Zorro is in fact Ramón, but he is too popular for anyone to testify against him.

Mendoza hearing that a stage coach carrying Senator Vanders and his daughter Lucille, and a million American dollars, is passing close by the ranch on its way to the tyrant Dictator' EI Presidente', arranges for the stage to be held up and the money to be used to further the revolution.

The raid is successful, the luggage stolen and with the help of Pablo and Pepe hidden at the ranch. This is no sooner done than Lopez arrives with news that the Americans will be staying at the Rancho to help him with his investigations. On their arrival, Lucille knows immediately that Zorro and Ramón are the same person, but finding the idea romantic promises not to denounce him and is rewarded with a kiss. Lola, herself in love with Ramón, decides to betray him to Lopez so that Lucille does not steal Ramón from her friend Raquelita.

Mendoza, having discovered that the money is in the form of a bank draft and concealed in the garments of the Americans, tells Mama and Ramón to search them. Pablo and Pepe arrange a performance of a flea circus during which an excuse is found to search the Senator. Nothing is found and they later hide in Lucille's bedroom and search her clothes. This time they are successful.

During a religious festival at the Aztec Temple, Ramón has arranged to hand over the draft to Mendoza, but the watching Lopez fires a shot which wounds Lola rather spoiling the fiesta, but Mama and Pepe soon restore the mood.

Mendoza arrives with the news that the revolution is over and the tyrant deposed. The draft is returned to the Senator, Sergeant Bernardo is promoted to Captain, Lopez is arrested and Zorro is pardoned. Ramón and Raquelita arrange their wedding and give our story a happy ending.
